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# Sat 18 January 2025 - Cotswolds LMC AGM and Annual Dinner - Angela Leaman

I am delighted to let you know that we will be returning to the Cotswolds for our AGM next



January. The venue will be the Hatton Court Hotel which is located near Painswick and 12 minutes' drive from Gloucester station. The Cotswold Way passes close by and there is good walking to explore. The AGM and private dinner will be held in the Cotswold Room.

I have a provisional booking for 14 rooms for Saturday night which will be held until the end of November. Bookings can be extended on request to Friday, for those who wish to arrive the night before. Walks will be arranged for mid-morning Saturday and on Sunday morning.

To book your place please call the hotel directly on 01452 617412 and quote my name to link into the LMC group booking and discount rate. Guests will be required to pay in full for Saturday dinner/accommodation at the time of booking, but Friday night can be paid for on arrival. Friday dinner can be at the hotel, or there is a cheap and cheerful pub 5 minutes' drive away at the Kings Head in Upton St Leonards.

The rates are as follows:

Saturday DB&B: Double £149 (total for 2 people); Single occupancy £129.

**Friday B&B**: Double £109; Single £99. Note there is no provisional booking held for Friday. The hotel is unlikely to be busy but advise booking earlier to ensure availability if staying two nights. All rooms will be Executive/Superior grade.

**T&C**: Bookings can be cancelled free of charge until 7<sup>th</sup> December. After 7<sup>th</sup> December we can cancel 2 rooms free of charge up to 48 hours prior to the event. Further cancellations will be charged in full.

### **Meet Reports**

### **Lake District Meet Report - 12 to 16 September 2024**

We stayed in two lovely adjacent cottages in the Duddon Valley near Seathwaite – not the wettest place in England, but another Seathwaite. The location was amazing with beautiful hills in every direction. Just out of the door there is a lovely quiet road then track leading to the pub over stepping stones (alternative route over bridge)

Our evening expedition there on arrival on Thursday led to someone getting wet feet.

On Friday 13<sup>th</sup> in excellent sunny weather all 6 of us set off towards Coniston Old Man via Seathwaite reservoir herding cows and calves in front of us on route.

After Elevenses at the end of the reservoir we split into two groups, one group ascending an almost vertical grass slope leading to the summit, and the other group descending to the valley via a waterfall and bog.

On Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> 5 of us set off, one decided to have a day enjoying the local scenery from the cottage. We walked directly from the cottages toward Harter Fell, starting off at a measured pace along a reasonable path. After a break, we split again into two groups, the first group heading across difficult boggy terrain to below Harter Fell, where we had difficulty in discerning the track marked on the map. After some bracken fighting and retreat, we finally found the route to arrive at the top in a gale. This was the easy part. The route down was wet, stony, steep and the path along the river we wanted to follow home when we got down was impassable, so we had a long walk back along the road. In the meantime, the other group had taken a slightly shorter route, but equally tricky one, back home.

Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> dawned wet. We decided on a cultural morning and explored the Coniston Museum, complete with Bluebird and Ruskin exhibitions. As the weather was clearing in the afternoon a group of 4 set off for Stickle Pike. The first path was indiscernible soaking wet underfoot and to waist height through the reeds and bracken, but once the other side of the field the path was well marked. Again, slightly different than the map we split up when David turned left to follow the third route to the pub. This turned out to be hazardous and he had to stay in the pub till dinner time when we met. Meanwhile 3 of us carried on and met our own problems, either due to poor navigation, or due to the poor guidebook. We battled our away through wet bracken before deciding to turn around and find another tour, which is in due course we did – a fine broad, clearly defined tour to the summit where we enjoyed fantastic views.

On three nights we ate in the pub, a short walk down the road or via a footpath. There was a good selection of standard pub grub and very friendly staff and locals. On Friday night we dined on a splendid meal prepared by Penny (not with us unfortunately) and cooked by David, with sous chef Marion. Thank you, Penny, the meat loaf was delicious.

The meet was enjoyed by all, regardless of fitness. It was nice to all start off on our walk together but then have a choice of longer or shorter walks for which there were many tempting options. There were very few people around. At the end of the stay we unanimously agreed to book the two cottages again for a whole week next year, using other locations (e.g. the pub) to broaden the offer to other LMC members. # Regent's Canal: Limehouse Cut, Lea River, Hertford Union Canal loop – Thursday 25 September

A depleted group of five met at Limehouse to continue our exploration of the East London waterways, with two prospective members unable to make it due to disruption on the trains. Paul, Charles, Alyson, Liz and I set off along the Limehouse Cut which connects the end of the Regents Canal and the Limehouse Basin to the River Lea and was built to cut out the longer journey by boat around the Isle of Dogs and Bow Creek. The banks of the Cut are slowly being developed with recently built and converted residential apartments replacing the old warehouses and factories.

At Bow Locks, where the Cut meets the River Lea Navigation and the Bow Creek, the path follows a long thin island between the two before arriving at Three Mills. On the island between two further joining rivers are the House and Clock Mills. The House Mill is believed to be the largest tidal mill still in existence, and there are plans to start generating hydroelectricity using two of the paddles. The island is also home to the Mills Studios, a large TV, film and music production space.

Our route then followed the River Lea Navigation which played a vital part in the construction of the Olympic Park which was visible from the towpath. After passing Old Ford Lock (and the house which hosted the Big Breakfast for 20 years) we stopped for lunch in Fish Island where the café was part of a new development of creative workspaces.
