Fri 9 - Sun 11 May - Gower, Wales – David Wells

It's a few years since the club visited the Gower (and actually not sure I've ever been!) and it will be a few years before John reaches there on the coast path, so I'm organising a weekend

meet in May, avoiding the public holidays. The Gower is great for coastal walks stretching from Rhossili in the west through Oxwich to The Mumbles in the East but also has some interesting if lowish hills.

I'm proposing to base the weekend in Reynoldston, which is slightly inland and away from the tourists. You are welcome to add either Thursday or Sunday nights as well - I will organise a full day walk on Saturday, probably walking from Reynoldston, and a longish half day on Sunday depending on interest. We will arrange dinners later - the King Arthur is well rated.

I've blocked 3 rooms until end December at each of Rushbrook Cottage (which takes pets) and Hills Court B&Bs (no pets), both of which offer continental breakfast in the room. For anyone wanting full English breakfast, the King Arthur hotel is also available. There are not too many other B&Bs so get in quick. If you wish to come, please contact the B&Bs directly quoting my name and/or LMC. Contact details are Claire Lloyd for Rushbrook Cottage and Jill John for Hills Court. Both are also available on Airbnb. There's also 1 room available at Luddington Grange (though I haven't blocked this). Most rooms are £80 or £90 single or double.

Sun 11 May – The Darent Valley, Kent – Paul Ackroyd

I am intending to organise a walk along part of the Darent Valley in Kent. It is a linear walk. We will start at the pretty village of Otford, where there are several pubs and tea rooms, and then take the Darent Valley path northward through Shoreham, where there are another three pubs and onto the village of Eynsford (more pubs!).

En route there are a number of interesting sites including the Castle Lavender farm, Lullingstone Country Park, Lullingstone Castle with its "World Garden of Plants" which has been featured in BBC TV series and the Lullingstone Roman Villa, which is managed by English Heritage and has some exceptional mosaics.

It should be possible to visit some of these. About 6 miles largely flat.

I propose that we should meet at Otford about 11 AM. For those travelling by public transport it is possible to catch a train from London Bridge or Victoria. For those driving I suggest parking in the Otford station car park for a modest fee. At the end of the walk, it will be possible for those travelling by public transport to get a train back to London from Eynsford or back to Otford to pick up the cars.

As you will have noted there are plenty of hostelries along the way but on Sunday in May they will be crowded so I suggest a sandwich for flexibility.

If you're interested in coming, please let me know by email and I will set up a WhatsApp group. At the moment trains seem okay, although the Thameslink is not running, but this will need to be kept under review.

Sat 17 January 2026 - LMC AGM and Annual Dinner

I am delighted to let you know that the 2026 AGM will be held at the Chiseldon House Hotel south of Swindon. I have a provisional booking for Friday and Saturday night and rooms will be held until the end of October.





The venue is near the Marlborough Downs where we stayed for the 2024 AGM but, never fear, your intrepid organiser has discovered new pastures to walk upon. A back road from the hotel will lead us to the North Wessex Downs in south Oxfordshire, which I don't think we have visited before. Notably, the area around Uffington with its famous prehistoric white horse. Chiseldon House is a grade II listed building which was built around 1821. Originally part of a large estate, the hotel has a spacious and elegant garden setting (although perhaps not

cocktails on the terrace in January!). The AGM and private dinner will be held in the Borelli room on Saturday night. Hospitality prices seem to have gone up rather sharply of late however I have negotiated a decent group discount.

To book your place please call the hotel directly and quote 'LMC' to obtain the group rate.

Guests are required to pay in full for accommodation at the time of booking, but dinner is paid for on arrival. Friday supper can be taken at the hotel, or there is a reasonable looking pub 5 minutes' drive away. The club has a historical link with The Plough on the Hill, as a pit stop for fish and chips en route down the M4 from Shell Centre to Wales on a Friday night!

Mid July 2026 – Opera and Mountains in Austria – Paul Ackroyd

I am hoping to arrange another trip to Austria as we have done twice in the past. The core of the visit is to stay in Bregenz on Lake Constance for the festival where they have an elaborate opera stage actually in the lake. Their productions are normally spectacular and in 2026 they will be doing Verdi's La Traviata. It will be probably sung in Italian with German subtitles. So unless you are fluent in one of these languages, you will not have a clue what is going on but a bit of pre reading of the synopsis should be sufficient and the visual experience is wonderful. After a couple of nights in Bregenz, we will travel (by bus or car) up to the small ski resort village of Damuls where we know a delightful little hotel run by an Austrian lady, Claudia, who has always made us very welcome in the past, and where the food and wine are excellent. The scenery is spectacular (if it's not raining) and there are some good walks accessible by chairlifts which in the past have been free.

The key constraint is accommodation in Bregenz which gets very busy at the time of the festival. Hotel bookings do not yet seem to be open, but I think they will be within the next couple of months. If you are interested in coming, please let me know by email and I will keep an eye for when hotels are taking reservations. It will be necessary to get in very early. Once we have some idea of who has booked, I will contact the hotel in Damuls and arrange tickets for the opera. In the past, people have done various other things around these core activities, including cycling all the way around Lake Constance. It will be up to you to make necessary transport arrangements (which are very easy) and plan any additions to your holiday.

Meet Reports

Dorking to Merthsam – 9 March 2025

After fun and games with an M25 closure and rail replacement bus services Marion, Charlie, Liz, Sean, and I were all punctual for our 10am start for what is typically the third stage of the North Downs Way.

After a short walk along the A24, albeit with a pleasant view of the vineyard we arrived at the



Stepping Stones Car Park at the foot of Boxhill. After a brief coffee cabin stop, we undertook the most difficult climb of the day, to be rewarded with a glorious view on a crisp, cloudless Spring morning of the Surrey and Sussex countryside. I stand by my description that the remainder of the walk was "undulating," although the climb onto Reigate Hill did clear out the lungs a bit.

We followed the trail along the ridge, enjoying views of the countryside, the remains of lime kilns that were dotted

long the trail and some water towers. Lunch was off the ridge but again with a pleasant view of the countryside.



After lunch we followed the trail for our second major climb of the day onto Reigate Hill. At the top we explored the Inglis Memorial which I later learned was built as a drinking fountain for horses, presumably rather posh horses.



This was followed by an exploration of Reigate Fort which we learned was built in 1898 to protect us from the French because the Government did not trust the Royal Navy to do the job. It was closed a mere 8 years later in 1906 following the launch of HMS Dreadnought.

After the Fort we descended into Gatton Park, designed by Lancelot "Capability" Brown for our afternoon coffee and ice cream stop.

The remainder of the walk was a gentle descent through a State Boarding School – who knew such things existed anymore – and a golf course to arrive at Merstham a little after 4pm. An enjoyable day all round and it was especially nice to meet our new members Liz and Sean, who were excellent company.

The Ramblers win landmark High Court appeal to save paths in historic Hayton Woods

The Ramblers recently won a long running legal case against an offshore company which was trying to permanently stop the public using a series of paths in historic Hayton Woods in Cumbria. If they had lost the case, there could have been far-reaching consequences for paths and access for Britain.

In conjunction with this news, they are fundraising for their Legal Fund which enables them to challenge issues which put public access and access to nature at risk – especially when they could set a dangerous precedent. Further information on the case can be found here


